- 31: Last day to reinstate lapsed CCLS credential

Upcoming Changes to the Child Life Internship Application

There's been a lot of buzz lately surrounding the new Internship Readiness Common Application. Please, take the time to update yourself on these changes!

Why were changes made?

- To increase efficiency for all stakeholders
- To reduce bias within the application
- To improve accessibility

What do internship candidates have to do?

- Complete the application (includes demographic information, coursework information, description of up to six relevant experiences, demonstration of Knowledge and Skills and Abilities [KSAs], and depth of interactions with children and families in five written responses)
- 2. Upload their unofficial transcripts as a PDF and
- 3. Upload their eligibility assessment as a PDF

What's the anticipated impact?

- For students: Less time-consuming, reduced costs, and a single application can be submitted to multiple sites electronically
- For internship sites: A more efficient review process, reduced opportunity for bias, and, application components help identify internship-ready candidates
- For academics: In-progress forms, letters of recommendation and references are no longer required and the application process is simple and consistent for all students

Volunteer Experiences

Now that pandemic restrictions are reduced, more related volunteer and work experiences are opening up geared toward those pursuing certification.

For child life students pursuing certification, volunteer experience is imperative to their ability to learn about the child life profession and secure clinical experiences. The COVID-19 pandemic restrictions greatly impeded opportunities for students to volunteer at most locations, both in-hospital and in community settings.

Although pandemic restrictions are still lingering, they have been dramatically reduced, allowing for students to participate in in-person or virtual volunteer opportunities that will aid in pursuing child life certification.

Soon, medical camps across the world will be seeking volunteers for their summer camp programming. Volunteering in the medical camp setting is a fantastic opportunity for students to build their skill sets by interacting with children of all ages and with diverse medical backgrounds. Volunteer opportunities in the camp setting comes in all shapes and sizes, too. Students may be interested in a camp counselor role, creating and implementing craft activities, or organizing large group games for campers. Most likely, there is a role in the camp setting that will align with what they are wanting to do and get experience in.

Encourage students to take a closer look into their community to learn more about non-profit organizations that support children and families. Many local organizations are offering in-person volunteer experiences again. For example, Ronald McDonald House Charities (in several locations) who serve families with critically ill or injured children have volunteer opportunities that are a great fit for child life students. Additionally, with schools back in-person, afterschool programming for youth has resumed. Afterschool programming is a great opportunity to enhance skills in facilitating large group play activities.

Virtual volunteer opportunities have become abundant during the pandemic and continue to be a great option for child life students pursuing certification. Some organizations have been created to provide virtual play programming for children, such as KiDS NEED MoRE and Project Sunshine. Both organizations depend on volunteers to help provide interactive play and activities to children who are facing medical challenges in or out of the hospital.

Although this list is not exhaustive, these are some ways that child life students can begin volunteering both in-person and virtually, in order to support their growth as a child life student and journey to child life certification.

Please encourage child life students to use ACLP Connect as a platform to share what volunteer opportunities they have had success in!

It Pays to Pay on Time

While fee due dates are not anyone's favorite day, it pays to pay on time. ACLP has three fees; two mandatory, and one optional (and beneficial). Certification maintenance is paid annually except on recertification year, and Recertification is paid once every five years, and these are mandatory fees that protect the CCLS credentials and allow you to proudly place CCLS after your name.

Those who fail to pay certification maintenance fees will lose the CCLS credential and must begin the certification process anew by meeting the current eligibility requirements and passing the examination. For example, if you completed a 480-hour internship in 2000, you would now have to complete an additional 120 hours before sitting for the certification exam to regain the credential.

If you passed the March, August, or November 2022 exam, your first certification annual maintenance fee payment is due by January 31, 2023. If you re-certified during 2022, your first annual maintenance fee payment for your new cycle is due by January 31, 2023.

ACLP will send you reminders about fee due dates. Check your user profile to ensure your email address is up-to-date. If you notice a lapse in your certification fee or need to update your contact details email certification@childlife.org.

Introducing ... the Ethics Corner!

For the next several issues of the CCLS Connection, we plan to highlight common ethical issues that may arise for CCLSs in their daily work. We are kicking off this effort by making sure that CCLSs know where they can go when they're faced with an actual or potential ethical issue.

- All CCLSs should be familiar with our Child Life Code of Ethics and how to reference it if needed. From the ACLP home page, click "Certification" and "Code of Ethics". This will lead you to the Code of Ethics, Social Networking Guidelines, and instructions on how to file an ethical complaint.
